What is Ethnicity?

Ethnicity is your cultural and ancestral background. It includes shared history, traditions, language, and sometimes religion. It's different from nationality or citizenship.

Nationality usually refers to the country where you are a citizen.

Citizenship is your legal status in a country. It grants rights like having a passport or voting.

Identifying Care Gaps:

Ethnicity data helps us spot differences in health outcomes and address disparities to improve care for all patients.

Enhancing Services:

Knowing the ethnic makeup of our patients allows us to tailor our services, offer culturally sensitive support, and improve accessibility.

Collecting this data helps us meet legal requirements and uphold policies that promote equality and prevent discrimination in healthcare.
